## "Church is an evolution"

A couple of weeks after we returned from General Synod, some of the delegates from the Central Atlantic Conference got together on Zoom with our conference minister, Freeman Palmer, for a debrief session. Freeman wanted to know what did we enjoy the most, what did we dislike, and how can we connect local church folks with our synod experience?

People enjoyed all of the things that make Synod such a rewarding experience: the fellowship about the delegate tables and dining tables; the family reunion and making new friends; wonderful speakers like Nadia Bolz-Weber, Dr. Ibram X. Kendi, and Bryan Stevenson; electing our new General Minister and President, Karen Georgia Thompson; working on the resolutions; learning about the UCC and wanting to become more involved; witnessing the wider church beyond the local church; and of course what we call BIG worship.

Some of the things people disliked: a few of the resolutions elicited painful stories of lament from attendees and not enough time or appreciation was given to those who shared; how can we be participatory in moments like that, responding with silence, prayer, or song? How do we allow for God, the Holy Spirit to break in? How do we moderate between timekeeping which keeps us on schedule and yet allow for emotional connection? Sometimes it feels like the clock overrides humanity. One thing I disliked was a consensus exercise that really wasn't consensus but more like taking a temperature reading of the room. We wish we could do more consensus building and yet Robert's Rules of Order help to keep such a large gathering (650+ delegates) on track.

In truth, General Synod is a small local church writ large. We long, we ache, we work for systemic change, to make decisions that make a material difference in human lives and in the life of the Church, but Church can often be slow to move, even as we make bold decisions at the national level. The UCC became Open and Affirming as a denomination in 1985 and yet almost 40 years later, more than 1,800 churches out of 4,700 are ONA —both a celebration and a lament, especially as state legislatures introduce and pass antitrans bills.

Enacting change and justice is slow, hard work, and yet it is gatherings like General Synod that fuel my hope. Hope that there will always be people willing to disrupt their lives for the sake of community, who love mercy and do justice, who embody the change they want to see in the world. Let us continue to ask ourselves how we as a local congregation can engage with the wider church to further our mutual work and witness.

## August Project: Rural Adolescent Girls' Health and Nutrition Education

Rural Adolescent Girls' Health and Nutrition Education is a project of Arogya World in India. Arogya World works to prevent non-communicable diseases (NDCs) through health education and lifestyle change, leveraging technology and partnerships to help people lead healthier lives.



By modifying and testing culturally-appropriate food and nutrition materials, this project aims to improve health behaviors known to prevent noncommunicable diseases, such as diabetes, heart disease, cancer, and chronic lung disease, and to improve the lifelong nutritional status of underprivileged rural adolescent girls.



We will meet again in Wells Hall at 12:30 p.m. on the fourth Friday, August 25, to share a

meal and learn more about this project. You may bring a small dish to share with others or your own brown bag lunch.

Of course, the method of transportation we choose matters. Generally, ground transportation is the most environmentally friendly option, especially in shared modes of transportation (like trains and buses). Cruises are easy to avoid, but if you find yourself unable to avoid a flight, <u>this article</u> from the New York Times offers some suggestions for reducing the carbon footprint of your air travel:

- Buy carbon offsets to counteract some of the damage caused by your flight. Some airlines offer the option to do this, but if yours does not, you can always purchase offsets through other organizations, where your money will go to activities like planting trees.
- Fly economy class, since the emissions generated by flying in business class are about three times as great as flying

# coach, according to a study by the World Bank.




Fly direct if possible. The article explains: "The more times you take off, the more fuel you use. According to a 2010 report from NASA, about 25 percent of airplane emissions come from landing and taking off. That includes taxiing, which is the largest source of emissions in the landing-takeoff cycle."

Interestingly, <u>this article</u> in the Guardian reports that a study published in the journal *Nature* revealed that nighttime flights are twice as bad for the environment as those that operate during the day. So, you may be able to easily reduce your impact on the planet by not flying at night

Finally, you might be surprised to learn that you can reduce flight's footprint by travelling more lightly. Every single pound on an airplane matters and has a big impact on how much fuel the flight uses. While it may seem insignificant, minimizing what you bring on board will actually lighten your contribution to the flight's emissions. Consider packing only what you truly need, choosing lighter-weight items (like a thin stainless steel water bottle instead of a glass one), and—no joke—using the airport's bathroom just before you board.

## **2023 BENEVOLENCE RECIPIENT: EXCEPTIONAL CARE for CHILDREN**

This is the second in a series of articles to inform the congregation about each of the benevolence recipients that the Social Justice Committee has chosen for fiscal year 2023.

Exceptional Care for Children is located in Newark and is the only Pediatric Skilled Nursing Facility in DE. It is also one of only a few Pediatric Nursing Homes in the United States. They currently have 31 bedrooms and serve up to 47 children from birth to 21 years old, but will soon be building an attached structure for young adults who have aged out of their program. The population they serve has complex medical and developmental needs. ECC's purpose is to provide each child with the customized learning, therapy, nutrition, and equipment they need to thrive, in a home-like and loving environment. They have onsite nurses 24/7; occupational, physical, speech, and respiratory therapists; nutritionists; and a teaching staff. Children who are able to attend school are taken to school by bus. ECC's mission statement is "Exceptional Care for Children improves the lives of medically fragile children and their families through skilled nursing, transitional, and palliative care. We are a haven for healing fragile bodies when improvement is possible, and a refuge for nurturing vulnerable spirits when a cure is unattainable." They are a top-100 ranked nursing home in the U.S.

We have given Exceptional Care for Children \$1000 a year for five years. In 2023, our money is being used for their Mobility Fund Program. This program pays for wheelchair parts, specialized seating, walkers, and standing equipment expenses that Medicaid does not cover. While standing independently may not be functional for an individual, it is important therapeutically to maintain healthy bones, muscles, and circulation.
