“Cultivating Care”

Earlier in June, the governor of Louisiana signed a bill that will require the Ten Commandments to be displayed in every public school classroom, including state-funded universities. Many pastors and other Christians I follow on Twitter commented that one never hears about evangelical or conservative Christians requiring the Beatitudes to be displayed. Some of the comments come *this* close to sounding like the Beatitudes are somehow better or require more from us than the Ten Commandments do. When the truth is, we as human beings have difficulty adhering to either set of religious morals. And neither one belongs in a public school classroom.

Even so, to get people on board, Jesus distilled the law and prophets to two commandments, and there were none greater than these: Love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength, and love your neighbor as yourself. Jesus viewed compassion and empathy as essential for living in community.

Those who are in favor of this law state that the Ten Commandments are “foundational documents of our state and national governments.” It has also been said that one does not need religion to have morals. If one cannot determine right from wrong, what is lacking is empathy, not religion. We cannot cultivate (or compel) love of God in a public school classroom but we can cultivate empathy and compassion, regardless of religious belief or not.

Human beings putting aside the ability to be empathetic and compassionate, neglecting it, and calling it weak, regardless of their politics, plays right into the hands of White Christian nationalism and empire. It is easier to dehumanize others and perpetuate violence against them when we have no feeling for them but fear and hate.

It is easier to enshrine privilege and hierarchy and segregate ourselves from each other.

Rather than trying to imagine ourselves in someone’s situation, empathy is more about learning from another person’s perspective and experience, listening to their emotions, and offering our understanding and help if we can. We’re not called to suffer with someone but to give care. It’s also important that we take care of our own spirits and ask for help when we need it.

If we want to cultivate empathy, we first need a mindset, a desire to grow spiritually, emotionally. We need to expose ourselves to differences in people, through books, movies, TV, places we visit, listening to others, volunteering, inviting others to join us. Cultivating and renewing our empathy is a spiritual practice, best done in community, both in person and online.

Now, we have the STAR Foundation using those back rooms and we have convened a Task Force to explore the feasibility of expanding our space upward!

sion of the Girls United Program which provides a holistic school curriculum to ensure that every girl has access to the critical resources she needs to come to school, stay in school, and thrive in school. Underpinned by the unique G.I.R.L.S. framework (composed of Guidance, Information, Resources, Leadership, and Skill-building) and year-long curriculum, this grant directly supports investment in 42 female teachers to launch and lead Girls United Clubs to address the biggest barriers to learning for girls aged 10-14, including early pregnancy and lack of sexual and reproductive health information.

Impact Network empowers and uplifts rural girls and young women in Zambia with an approach that addresses the critical challenges they face.



Impact Girls is committed to addressing issues such as limited agency in decisions regarding health, as well as the scarcity of essential menstrual health hygiene materials and knowledge. Additionally, the grant aims to create economic opportunities for rural African communities. The project will support key components of the Impact Girls Program, benefiting over 3,000 girls and women, including Menstrual Health Workshops, GLOW Clubs (Girls Leading Our World Clubs), NetGirls Zambia League, Financial Literacy for Women, Female Mentor Program, and more.

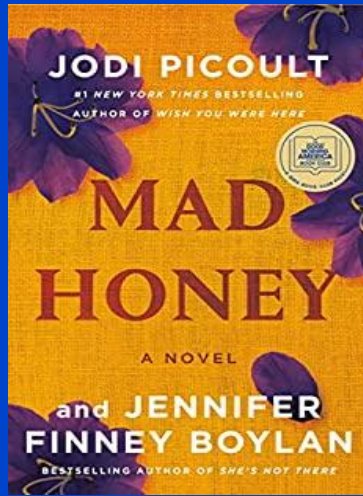
Mark your calendars for first Wednesdays via Zoom and second Sundays in person as we explore some history of ancestors in the faith.

CONTINUING to INVESTIGATE the POSSIBILITIES of OUR PROPERTY

In the spring of 2023, we had a newsletter article and a discussion at the Congregational Meeting about the possibility of creating a multi-story building on the church's property, with the first floor being for our congregation's use. We would then partner with a housing organization which would manage multiple floors of low-income apartments.

One of our major questions is whether the property can support a multi-story building. Determining the answer to this will require an engineering evaluation. At the June Coordinating Committee, the Committee created a task force to prepare us for an engineering evaluation. There are three who already have agreed to serve on the task force: John Williams, Mike Lonergan, and Tim Brasel. Recently, we have become aware of a potential funder for the engineering evaluation. The question asked by the potential funder was, "If we learned that it is possible to build a multi-story building on this property, would the congregation support the concept of the church sharing the building with an affordable housing project?"

A poll was taken this week to answer that question. Of the 46 participants, more than 90 percent responded that they would be willing to go forward with the concept of having the church share a multi-story building with an affordable housing project if the engineering survey shows that it is possible to build a multi-story building on the property.

CLIMATE CHANGE — “Just the Facts, Ma’am”

My older brother, Ken, composed the following response to the *Arizona Courier*, addressing an article regarding climate change. This month's *Earthwise Tips* covers Ken's first four response's and *Earthwise Tips* in the September newsletter will cover responses 5-8 along with ending summary comments. I hope you find Ken's comments informative. —Ron Hartman

Many articles in the *Courier* over the past year contend there is no global warming—that it's a deception produced by ignorant or corrupt bureaucrats/academicians, funded by a “global cabal” that, for obscure reasons, is enamored of deceiving everyone. That's not only paranoid, it avoids the issue. Science requires that the climate hypothesis, itself, must be proven/disproven—motivations of the protagonists are irrelevant.

The articles are replete with false statements which are refuted below, based solely on observations, measurements, and established physics/chemistry—starting points (of

“knowable validity”) in any consideration of climate change.

- 1) *There has been no increase in global temperature and it started down 20 years ago.* **False.** Thousands of measurements by independent agencies have shown a 1.1°C increase since 1900 and a ≥ 0.3 °C increase over the last 20 years.
- 2) *Global ice coverage is actually increasing.* **False.** 400 billion tons are being lost annually, for a cumulative loss of 8 trillion tons since 2002.
- 3) *Fluctuating solar output correlates with the temperature rise over the last hundred years.* **False.** Satellite measurements over the last 60 years have shown constant solar irradiance at $\sim 1361 \pm 1 \text{ W/m}^2$, while average global

temperature has risen $\sim 0.8^\circ\text{C}$. (NASA/NOAA)

- 4) *CO₂ cannot affect the global temperature.* **False.** Radiation falling on the earth from the sun ($\sim 5000^\circ\text{K}$) is mostly in the visible range. Radiation into space from the earth ($\sim 288^\circ\text{K}$) is in the infrared range. To maintain a constant temperature, the energy emitted must equal the energy absorbed. While CO₂ is essentially transparent in the visible region, it absorbs in the infrared, thus decreasing the amount of energy escaping into space and thereby increasing surface temperature.

Community Health Service Learning

Each year, the Social Justice Committee distributes NAUCC's Benevolence budget among various local nonprofits. One group that received a benevolence from NAUCC this year for the first time is an organization called Lori's Hands. This nonprofit began its work with UD students back around 2009 and became its own nonprofit organization in 2012.

Lori's Hands builds mutually beneficial partnerships between community members with chronic illness and college students. They train college student volunteers to make weekly visits to community members who live with chronic illness. These folks often need helpers like these students to help them keep living comfortably on their own. Students help with tasks that an elderly or ill person can no longer handle on their own. Meanwhile, the clients help educate the students about how challenging it can be living in the real world with disabilities. Both clients and students benefit from this collaborative relationship.

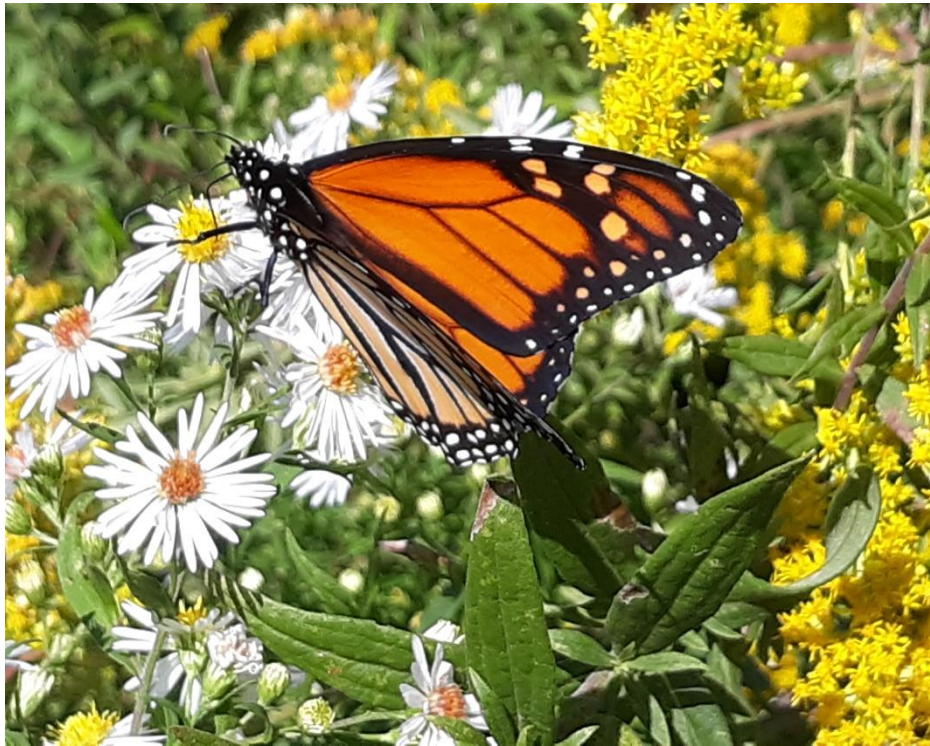
