"Perpetuating Hope"

In the 1990 Christmas film "Home Alone," Kevin's mom Kate McCallister rants to an airline ticket agent, "This is Christmas! The season of perpetual hope! And I don't care if I have to get out on the runway and hitchhike! If it costs me everything I own, if I have to sell my soul to the devil himself, I am going to get home to my son."

She reminds me of that quote about hope, not the one with feathers and never stops at all, but this one seen on Twitter: "People speak of hope as if it is this delicate, ephemeral thing made of whispers and spider's webs. It's not. Hope has dirt on her face,

blood on her knuckles, the grit of the cobblestones in her hair, and just spat out a tooth as she rises for another go."

Alright, maybe that's going a bit too far. Maybe it's somewhere in between, but hope is still very much an act of rebellion and defiance. Hope is something we can give to ourselves as much as to other people. Hope is not passive; it's active. Hope needs to be fed every day, sometimes every moment. It's no wonder we celebrate Christmas in the northern hemisphere at the solstice, when we need hope and light the most.

We need to get really good at perpetuating hope, how to create it and how to sustain it, and Advent and Christmas are just the season to begin such a spiritual practice.

Some of it is self-care, like rest and movement, eating well, reading or meditation or prayer, as well as fun and play and creativity. When was the last time you watched "A Charlie Brown Christmas" or "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" or whatever your favorite Christmas movie

is? This is a time for all the things that make us feel cozy and snug.

Some of it is caring for others, whether it's grocery shopping for someone, making endof-year donations, cooking a meal or baking cookies for a neighbor, or helping someone with a household expense or unexpected purchase. This is a time for building up our hope muscles by sharing what we have.

As much as hope is about looking forward, it's also about looking back and learning about how people found their own sources of hope and what they did to sustain it. One such source is the book of Isaiah. It's a long one, sixty-six chapters, but one chapter a day could take you through to the beginning of February. It starts out rather rough but stay with it. I recommend *The Message* by Eugene Peterson, which you can read online using the following link:

December Project: "GAIA Vaccine Foundation"



Mission of GAIA Vaccine Foundation: GAIA Vaccine Foundation's mission is to reduce the incidence of infectious diseases that disproportionately affect the underserved and promote the development of globally relevant, globally accessible vaccines that can be distributed on a not-for-profit basis in the developing world.

Summary: Our grant will fund a year-long educational community outreach campaign on HPV, the HPV vaccine and cervical cancer. This campaign will assist in the introduction of the HPV vaccine to Mali and improve general knowledge about HPV/cervical cancer so that women and girls are able

How to End Christian Nationalism

The news is filled with stories of the impact of Christian Nationalism on our politics, our country, and our freedoms. Please join us on December 8 for our Second Sunday presentation in which we will be discussing the very timely book *How to End Christian Nationalism*.

Here is a brief <u>amazon.com</u> summary of the book: *The essential guidebook for Christians alarmed by the rising tide of Christian nationalism yet unsure how to counter it.*

Christian nationalism is a powerful and pervasive ideology, and it is becoming normalized. From Amanda Tyler, lead organizer of the Christians Against Christian Nationalism campaign, comes *How to End*

Christian Nationalism, your vital companion for countering this dangerous ideology. Tyler draws on her experiences, conversations with pastors and laypeople, research, Scripture, her Baptist convictions, and her work as a constitutional law expert to help us confront Christian nationalist fervor.

You'll learn how to distinguish Christian nationalism from the teachings of Jesus and to demonstrate how the former perpetuates white supremacy. This book also unpacks key truths we can share with others: Patriotism is not the same as nationalism. Religious freedom means little if it's not for everyone. Christians follow a gospel of love, not the idol of power.

CODE PURPLE BEGINS

Please help support the Code Purple ministry by volunteering during the nights that our church will be hosting this winter. A Code Purple night is called by the Newark Empowerment Center when outside air temperatures become lifethreatening (fall below 20 degrees or reach a wind chill below 15 degrees).

New Ark UCC will be one of five Newark churches which take turns opening their doors to provide overnight shelter and a hot meal to the homeless in our community. We will be second in rotation. UD will again provide the meals with buffet style service and communal dining.

NEC will have staff assigned from 6:00 p.m.-6:00 a.m. for check-in, check-out, and overnight monitoring, but we will need to provide one male and one female volunteer. All guests will need to preregister with NEC to learn the location; locations will not be publicized and volunteers should not share the location with others. Laundry service will be arranged by NEC.

The shifts and tasks that need to be staffed are as follows:

- > Set up, 5:00-6:00 p.m.
 - This is a one-hour time commitment prior to guest arrival and no guest contact is required. It involves setting up Wells Hall with mattresses and bedding, preparing the dining area, and making coffee.
- Check-in and hospitality, 6:00-8:00 p.m.
 Assist the NEC staff person with guest check-in, set up the meal provided by UD, handle after diner cleanup, and provide hospitality.
- Monitor Assistant (two shifts), after dinner from 8:00-11:59 p.m. and overnight from 12:00-6:00 a.m. Church volunteer to aid NEC staff person as needed.

If you would be willing to help out December through March, please let me know which shifts you are willing to cover, and whether you would be willing to do these shifts at another Code Purple church if they are in need of volunteers.





From upcycled gifts to fishing trips and vacation homes, our Auction has something for everybody!


